This year, our programs quickly adapted to continue our mission during the unprecedented Covid-19 pandemic. Covid-19 increased stress, isolation, and the risk of child abuse and childhood trauma. Your support helped the children and families in our community recover from this trauma.

Over 90% of abuse happens at the hands of someone the child knows, loves and trusts.

Childhood experiences impact future physical and mental health and opportunity. Much of the foundational research about Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) shows they have important public health implications. Thanks to your support, we are able to help children and adults affected by ACEs build resilience and lead healthier lives.

## Navigating Media and Technology with Kids during a Pandemic

Christy, mom to children ages 4 and 7, recently relocated to escape an abusive living situation. Christy found her way to a Parenting Class offered at her child's preschool by our Community Education team. She attended two classes before the pandemic hit - the first about Kids, Media, and Technology Safety and the second one about Managing Stress. During shelter in place orders, Christy reached out to our Prevention Education Specialist to see how to apply the skills she'd learned during the pandemic. With your help, our staff was able to provide Christy with continued support, encouragement and resources – giving her the strength and confidence she needed to help her kids and bring her family closer together.

**24/7 Dad:** A 12-week parenting development and support program open to all fathers, taught by nationally certified Quad Cities dads.

**All Our Kids (AOK) Network:** Provides structure and support to prioritize partnerships and address barriers to ensure healthy starts for children in our community. We work to ensure services for children ages 0 to 5 are collaborative, comprehensive and reflect our community need.

**Basic Training for New Dads:** Taught by dads, for dads. Led by volunteers, it is the only program of its kind specifically for fathers preparing for the birth of a child.

#### **Child and Family Treatment and Assessment Services:**

Facilitates screening and assessment services to increase the identification and treatment of children and families impacted by prenatal or environmental exposure to alcohol and/or substance use.

**Child Protection Center:** This welcoming home environment in Muscatine provides children a place to tell their story after abuse or neglect. Working with law enforcement, Department of Human Services, mental health providers and health care professionals, children receive forensic interviews, medical exams, coordinated team investigations and are treated with dignity and respect during the investigative process.

**Community Education and Training:** Delivering high-quality community education and training to professionals and parents, this program puts the adults in our community at the forefront of prevention and reinforces their responsibility to keep kids safe.

Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA): An everyday citizen, specially trained to advocate in juvenile court for the best interests and safety of children ages 17 and younger involved in criminal proceedings as the victims of abuse and neglect. CASA volunteers gather information, identify resources and work in partnership with all parties in the case to ensure the child's needs are met.

**Doula Services:** Assists parents before, during, and after childbirth; providing education and support to the family. This program ensures a baby has the best possible start in life.

**Families First:** From activities centered on the father/child relationship to weekly playgroups and regular parenting classes, we partner with the U.S. Army to support our service men and women and their families to decrease isolation and increase socialization.

**Healthy Families Home Visitation:** Provides new parents with accredited home visitation services to create a safe and nurturing environment for young children by building confidence and strengthening goal setting and attainment skills.

**Safe From the Start:** Provides therapy and case management to help children heal from trauma exposure and prevent future trauma from occurring by using play therapy services specifically for children ages 0-5. By supporting a child and family early, we prevent future potential obstacles such as truancy, juvenile delinquency, and physical and mental health challenges.

**Second Step:** A program paired with local preschools to provide children, teachers and parents with information they need to stay safe and prevent child sex abuse.
